Community Affairs at IHDA

Community Affairs currently oversees 9 programs, which play a critical role in helping IHDA to realize its efforts in providing assistance to communities and homeowners in support of the preservation of affordable housing opportunities throughout Illinois.







Community Revitalization Programming

IHDA works with local governments and non-profit organizations to administer two programs to combat the ongoing effects of the housing crisis and assist with revitalization efforts, address vacant residential properties, and the blight which usually follows.

For every dollar spent towards demolition, the value of homes in the targeted demolition area increase \$4.27.1

For every dollar spent to clean and green vacant properties, the community sees an additional \$7.43 in property tax revenue.²





Land Bank Capacity Program and TA Network Overview

This program was created to assist communities outside the Chicago Metropolitan Statistical Area by providing funding to help empower local and regional revitalization efforts by increasing planning and land banking capacity.


Funded from national settlement with nation's largest banks secured by state attorneys general, including the Illinois Attorney General, with the U.S. Department of Justice and HUD.

IHDA awarded \$2,500,000 in settlement funds

- \$1,650,000 will finance awards under the Land Bank Capacity Program
- \$150,000 will finance awards under the Technical Assistance Network





FORECLOSURE PREVENTION & FINANCIAL LITERACY

When homeowners and renters struggle financially, communities suffer, which is why IHDA provides services to help. Through grant programs, IHDA funds a network of housing counseling agencies and community-based organizations to increase their training and capacity, and provide financial literacy, foreclosure prevention, and pre-purchase counseling to current and future homeowners.

Foreclosure Prevention Program

Provides grants to community based organizations and housing counseling agencies approved by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for capacity building, operational expenses, pre and post purchase counseling, financial literacy counseling, foreclosure counseling and education, and staff/counselor training.

Provides grants to housing counseling agencies approved by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for capacity building, operational expenses, pre and post purchase counseling, financial literacy counseling, foreclosure counseling and education, and staff/counselor training.



Saving My Home





If you are struggling to make your mortgage payments, it can be a scary and stressful time. You are not alone. The first step you should take is to call your lender or servicer directly and explain your situation. If you are unable to find a solution, you may be eligible for one of the programs listed below.

If you are having trouble paying your mortgage and have experienced a 15% reduction in income due to a hardship, you may be eligible for temporary mortgage assistance through the Illinois Hardest Hit Fund Program. Homeowners across Illinois can apply for up to \$35,000 in reinstatement and/or ongoing monthly mortgage assistance. 

HOMEOWNER ASSISTANCE (TRUST FUND)

The Community Affairs Department also helps homeowners to affordably purchase and make necessary improvements to their homes. The following 3 programs aid homeowners in making necessary repairs and accessibility improvements, allowing them to stay in their homes while improving the quality of single-family housing, and helping to create vibrancy in neighborhoods throughout Illinois.

- Assists low- and very low-income homeowners
- Funds can be used to make necessary home repairs (roofing, siding, etc.)
- Forgivable loans up to \$45,000 per household, or \$16,500 for Roof Only
- Units of local government and non-profit organizations apply and administer awards

- Assists income-qualified households
- Funds can be used to offset construction costs or buy down sales price to ensure mortgage affordability
- Forgivable loans up to either \$15,000 or \$20,000 per household¹
- Administered by Habitat for Humanity of Illinois

- Assists income-qualified households with elderly or disabled residents
- Funds can be used to make repairs that will allow tenants to remain in their homes
- Forgivable loans up to \$25,000 per household
- Units of local government and nonprofit organizations apply and administer awards



HOMEOWNER ASSISTANCE (TRUST FUND)

Single Family Rehabilitation (SFR)

Round 1 ended in March 2019. Round 2 Legal Agreements with **21 agencies and cities** were signed effective in April of 2019.

Amount allocated for Round 2 = \$10,000,000.

Habitat for Humanity Community Impact Program

Round 3 concluded in February 2018; Legal agreements for Round 4 were signed effective in March of 2019. Amount allocated for Round 4 = \$2,000,000.

Housing Accessibility Program (HAP)

Round 1 ended in March of 2019. Round 2 with **15 agencies** was approved by the IHDA Board in April 2019. Amount allocated for Round 2 = \$3,000,000.

CAPACITY BUILDING & TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE (TRUST FUND)

Recipient organizations' use of these funds helps to comprehensively strengthen the affordable housing industry through capacity building, public policy initiatives, and increased civic engagement.

Technical Assistance Grant




